A) State Aid	1. How can an applicant confirm if a particular funding falls under the De Minimis criteria?	The general rule is that grantees must be notified if funding falls under De Minimis or any other form of State Aid. For grants an applicant has already received, this should be stated in the Grant Agreement and it is the applicant’s responsibility to check any Grant Agreements to confirm this. If an ongoing funding call falls under de minimis, this should be stated in the guidelines.
	2. What is State Aid is and does it refer also to philanthropic funding?	State Aid refers to state funding given to “undertakings” which may provide them with an advantage over other undertakings. Such funding is therefore only permissible under certain exemptions, in the case of this programme under the de minimis exemption, which notes that certain amounts would be too small to distort the market. Further information is included in the applicant guidance. Philanthropic funding would generally not be State Aid as it is generally not “State Resources” but it is noted that all De Minimis Aid granted must be notified to recipients as being De Minimis Aid and applicants are therefore advised to check their grant agreements for further clarity.

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	3. Is Community Services Programme (CSP) considered State Aid?	No, CSP is not State Aid and does not count towards de minimis.
	4. Is Dormant Accounts Fund Growing Social Enterprise Funding considered State Aid?	No, this was found not to be State Aid and does not count towards de minimis.
	5. Is Workability funding considered State Aid?	Workability funding does not fall under State Aid.
	6. Is HSE (Health Service Executive) funding for disability service providers considered State Aid?	While this appears unlikely, it is strongly recommended that applicants check any Grant Agreements, as State Aid needs to be clearly noted in such Agreements. The onus is on the applicant to clarify whether or not funding they are in receipt of is considered State Aid.

Generally speaking, capital cost is not eligible, with the exception of small items where these are directly needed for the delivery of the project. More detail on eligible and ineligible expenditure is included in the guidance document and budget template.
	2. What is the minimum grant size?	The minimum grant size is € 70,000 for 24 months.
	3. Do you fund staff positions with this grant?	For an indicative list of eligible and ineligible expenditure, please refer to the applicant guidance p. 19-21 and the budget template available for download at the New Solutions Social Innovation Hub website, as well as the section "What does the fund offer" at the bottom of the website.

If it is informal collaboration, we do not need financial data of them, but a description of the co-design/stakeholder involvement in the relevant section of the application.

This would not be an issue and that there is no difference in marks based on whether one or more of the themes are being addressed. The important point is to demonstrate clearly that at least one is met and how this is evidenced.

It can be shorter than 24 months as long as it starts and finishes within the timelines. Please note: The contract issued will run for the full 24 months to align reporting periods, payment schedule etc for all grantees. If activities are completed earlier that is fine, but be

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		mindful of the above fact. This means the final payment will only be made after the final report is reviewed and approved after the full 24 months period etc.
	10. Do partners have to be based in Ireland? Or can a German or UK partner with relevant experience be listed as a "Consultant"?	There is a difference between a partner and a consultant. A consultant can be procured within the EU as long as procurement rules are met. UK may be tricky for GDPR, but might be possible. Partners: need to be in Ireland as they would be direct grant recipients rather than a contractor paid for services.

	24. We are a group of volunteers, are we eligible for this grant?	The legal form criteria in the applicant guidance and on the website must be met by 31 May 2026. It is recommended to have paid staff to ensure the project is implemented, but it is not a legal requirement.

	26. Other grant applications are currently pending; do we need to indicate the amounts?	You should be able to run the project with only the New Solutions pilot grant, to ensure it is feasible.

	38. Are Pobal CSP (Community Service Programme) Eligible to apply?	Pilot projects are typically at the early stages in the organisation's development. CSP organisations are usually long-established community businesses. Applicants in receipt of CSP funding could be considered in receipt of duplicate funding.
	39. Does the requirement for the project to be innovative relate to the content/concept alone or also the methodology? i.e. if we deliver educational programmes through tried and tested methods, but the content has not been provided/available before does this qualify?	This depends. If a new methodology addresses a gap that is existent in existing methodologies, that might be considered innovative. If the methodology is established and the content was not available before and the content addresses a real gap, it might also be innovative.
	40. If for example, I'm using sport as a means to integrate 2 groups, if I have run this before in another place, but only with one of the groups, would this be eligible?	If the new solution is a new concept and not just a replication from the first project, it might count as pilot. A clear distinction of concepts would be needed to be considered as eligible.
	41. Does 'sport' (theme 4) include physical activities for which there is no National Governing Body accredited with Sport Ireland?	The Sport Ireland ESF+ Action "Sport 4 Empowerment" (S4E) that implements socially innovative programmes, using sport and physical activity, to foster social inclusion and enhance the wellbeing, education, and economic prospects of people at risk of social exclusion.

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	1. I had a small 5k grant from Rethink when I completed the Accelerated Mentorship programme - does this disqualify us from this fund?	This is not a Rethink Ireland Fund, but a New Solutions Social Innovation Fund Grant. Therefore, this does not impact the process of application. The criteria for the pilot grants need to be met (this pilot project has not received funding - see eligibility & criteria on the website)
	2. What if you're registered as a sole trader but your business has a social impact focus on employment and young people?	Your organisation must meet the eligibility in section 10 of the Applicant Guidance. Please download from https://www.new-solutions.ie/pilotgrants . 	3. Can an organisation submit more than one application? For example a local authority submitting applications from the Sports Dept and another from the arts office?	Yes they can, but due to the competitive nature of the grant, it is unlikely that both projects will be given a grant.

This fund is to trial a new idea or solution, so if you have received previous grant funding for the pilot, it is most likely already up and running.
